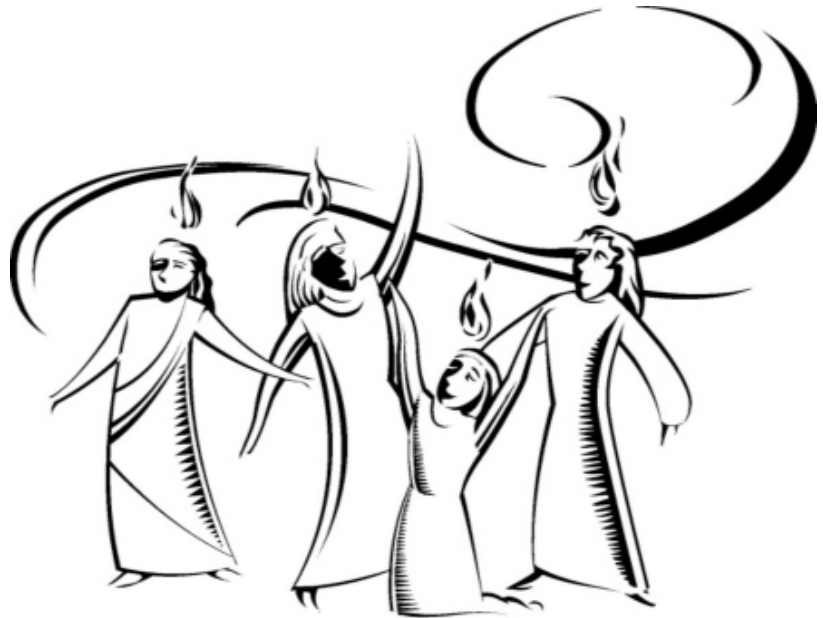

FIRST READING

Acts 2:1-11

When Pentecost day came round, the apostles had all met in one room, when suddenly they heard what sounded like a powerful wind from heaven, the noise of which filled the entire house in which they were sitting; and something appeared to them that seemed like tongues of fire; these separated and came to rest on the head of each of them. They were all filled with the Holy Spirit, and began to speak foreign languages as the Spirit gave them the gift of speech.

Now there were devout men living in Jerusalem from every nation under heaven, and at this sound they all assembled, each one bewildered to hear these men speaking his own language. They were amazed and astonished. 'Surely' they said 'all these men speaking are Galileans? How does it happen that each of us hears them in his own native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; people from Mesopotamia, Judaea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya round Cyrene; as well as visitors from Rome – Jews and proselytes alike – Cretans and Arabs; we hear them preaching in our own language about the marvels of God.'

RESPONSORIAL PSALM

Ps 103:1, 24, 29-31, 24

*Lord, send out your Spirit
and renew the face of the earth.*

SECOND READING

Romans 8:8-17

People who are interested only in unspiritual things can never be pleasing to God. Your interests, however, are not in the unspiritual, but in the spiritual, since the Spirit of God has made his home in you. In fact, unless you possessed the Spirit of Christ you would not belong to him. Though your body may be dead it is because of sin, but if Christ is in you then your spirit is life itself because you have been justified; and if the Spirit of him who raised Jesus from the dead is living in you, then he who raised Jesus from the dead will give life to your own mortal bodies through his Spirit living in you.

So then, my brothers, there is no necessity for us to obey our unspiritual selves or to live unspiritual lives. If you do live in that way, you are doomed to die; but if by the Spirit you put an end to the misdeeds of the body you will live.

Everyone moved by the Spirit is a son of God. The spirit you received is not the spirit of slaves bringing fear into your lives again; it is the spirit of

THE HOLY SPIRIT: FILL YOUR TANK

I have a couple of friends with whom I don't like driving. Each likes to see how far below empty he can go with the fuel gauge before filling up. Both have run out of petrol many times. One even ran out on a back road in the Northern Territory!

I've known other people - young people and adults - who run out of "gas" in other ways. They start projects with a lot of energy and ideas but can't seem to finish them. That doesn't have to happen with Christians. Our fuel is the Holy Spirit. And the petrol station is always open.

Some people have trouble understanding how the Holy Spirit can make a difference in daily life. I think this week's Gospel makes that clear. Jesus breathes on the Apostles and says, "Receive the Holy Spirit". He does that after saying that he sends us into the world as God sent him. So, Jesus gave the Spirit as fuel for doing his mission.

What's the point? If you want to really see how the Spirit can impact your life, call on the Spirit's power to help you live like Jesus. You can do that in many ways. When you're ready to explode, stop and ask the Spirit to calm you. When you're ready to go along with the crowd instead of standing up for what's right, stop and ask the Spirit to boost you. When you feel like turning away from someone who needs you, stop and ask the Spirit to help you care.

This isn't magic. Like many things, you get better at letting the Spirit empower you the more often you call upon the Spirit. I know that I'm more able to feel the Spirit in clutch moments if I'm praying regularly each day. Again, like cars, we need regular maintenance (a

daily prayer life), not just occasional trips to the petrol station.

So fill up. There's a world full of people waiting for you to drive up with hope, healing, and justice.

DO YOUR BEST AND DON'T WORRY

As a youth minister in a Victorian parish, I spend four years working in a small community that was not blessed with more than a handful of Sunday Mass lectors. Every year it seemed that the same lector was scheduled to read on Pentecost. As sincere, devout, and well-intentioned as he was, there was no way he was capable of pronouncing correctly the names of the areas from which the Jewish people travelled in the first reading from the Acts of the Apostles. He wouldn't even try. He'd see the first few letters and off he'd go into more familiar territory. So Parthians became "part-timers". Mesopotamia became Minnesota. Cappadocia became Cappuccino. And Cretans became Croatians. He created his own fantasy world. You could not doubt his good intentions or faith even as you smiled and then laughed at his reading.

I ran into him some years later. His

family was all grown. He and his wife moved to another parish where they both became involved. I had to ask him if he was still a lector. He gave me a big smile and told me that he gave it up long ago. Innocently he said it just wasn't one of his "gifts".

This week we celebrate the gifts of the Holy Spirit given to us so that we might each in our own way proclaim and share the faith given to us. On this Pentecost I want to honour this former lector and all those who do the best they can and who continue to give of themselves for the good of the church and all of us. *GPBS eNews*

sons, and it makes us cry out, 'Abba, Father!' The Spirit himself and our spirit bear united witness that we are children of God. And if we are children we are heirs as well: heirs of God and coheirs with Christ, sharing his sufferings so as to share his glory.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION

*Alleluia, alleluia!
Come, Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of
your faithful and kindle in them the fire
of your love. Alleluia!*

GOSPEL

John 14:15-16,23-26

Jesus said to his disciples:

'If you love me you will keep my commandments.

I shall ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you for ever.

'If anyone loves me he will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we shall come to him and make our home with him.

Those who do not love me do not keep my words.

And my word is not my own: it is the word of the one who sent me.

I have said these things to you while still with you; but the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything and remind you of all I have said to you.

DID YOU KNOW?

- Pentecost was originally a Jewish harvest festival, celebrated fifty days after the Passover. It was one of the great pilgrimage festivals of the Jews, and this is why so many pilgrims were present in Jerusalem on the day when the Spirit was manifested in the lives of the disciples.
- The Christian feast of Pentecost is fifty days after Easter and is the culmination of the Lent-Easter-Pentecost cycle.
- The church teaches that the Holy Spirit brings both gifts and fruits to the faithful (see Sharing the Tradition).
- Pentecost Sunday was often known as Whit Sunday or Whitsun, especially in England.

SYMBOLS AND IMAGES

Red is the colour that is often associated with the Spirit, and red vestments are worn by the priest on Pentecost Sunday. Red symbolises the intense love or 'fire' of the Holy Spirit. Other symbols of the Spirit are tongues of flame, wind and a white dove. All have their origins in Scripture. Each of these conveys something of the mystery of the Spirit of God, which is beyond human understanding.

SHARING THE TRADITION

Coming to faith is not so much acquiring a new set of beliefs about God as it is discovering God's existence within the realities of our daily lives. The gifts and fruits of the Holy Spirit help us to be more attuned to the actions of God in our lives and in our world. At baptism, the Spirit comes upon the newly initiated Christian, and at confirmation, the Spirit of God is renewed and confirmed in the faithful.

The seven gifts of the Holy Spirit are: wisdom, understanding, counsel (right judgment), fortitude (courage), knowledge, piety (reverence) and fear (awe) of the Lord.

The church lists twelve fruits of the Spirit: charity (love), joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, generosity, gentleness, faithfulness, modesty, self-control and chastity.
