## MY STORY ... (with Mary Fitzpatrick)

I was born on 11 August, 1933 in Willunga and am the youngest of the four children of my parents - Charles and Elizabeth (nee Dunn) Fitzpatrick. My brothers Jim, Terry, Mick and I had a very happy childhood, full of the usual pranks which boys would invariably get up to, but being the baby of the family and the only girl, I was always made to feel very special.

I went to primary and junior secondary school at Willunga and then did a secretarial course at St Aloysius College in the city before commencing work for a Stock Company in Adelaide, where I stayed on for the rest of my working life. I would travel by bus into the city each day – leaving home at 7.00am and arriving back at 7.00pm. I loved my job and led a very busy life.

My mother died when I was 18 years old and so with the three boys still at home I was busy with household duties on weekends. However, my brothers were very helpful and I am sure all the work we did together gave us a very special bond which lasted all our lives. I am the last of my immediate family who is left now and I look back on those early years with fond memories.

I took almost two years off from work in the mid 1960's and sailed overseas on a working holiday. It was a most interesting and adventurous time in my life. I lived and worked in places like Holland, Sweden, Switzerland, Spain and Portugal – even rode on a camel in Egypt! I worked in retail and also worked in garden centres tending to bulbs – and this gave me my life-long love of anything to do with gardening. In spite of the language barriers I found the experience of living and working in other countries most enjoyable and it gave me a love of travelling.

After my brother Mick married Carmel (who came from Ireland) I went on a hitchhiking tour of Ireland and was able to connect with family relatives there.

I retired in 1985 and helped my brother Jim, who was at that time Sacristan at the Church. I eventually took over this job when Jim's health began to deteriorate.

My parents were hard working, loyal Catholics, as were my grandparents, and we have two windows in St Joseph's Church dedicated to the memory of family members. There is also a statue and a pew in the Church donated by my grandfather. Willunga has always been home for me and the St Joseph's Church Community continues to be an important part of my life.

# GET UP FOR A LITTLE BIT!

## ANDREW O'BRIEN

(Researched by Michelle Cormack)

Andy O'Brien, a well known Mail Coach driver in the Willunga area, is buried with his wife, Elizabeth, and their daughter in St Joseph's Cemetery Willunga. Their headstone was carved by one of the notable slate carvers of Willunga, William Hawken.



Andrew O'Brien was a Mail Coach driver in the Willunga area between Willunga and Adelaide during the 1850s and 1860s. He was born in 1822 and came to Australia from Glendalough in Ireland. He and his wife, Elizabeth Leigh, had five children between 1853 and 1858. Their third child, Hugh, died at 2 years of age and Mary, their last child, died at nine weeks. It is known that one of their children lived to marriageable age. The O'Brien family lived at 19 St Judes Street, Willunga.

Anecdotes about Andy in the newspapers paint a picture of a popular, energetic and sociable man.

Road travel during the 19th century could be a hazardous experience, with stories of injuries and people jumping off careering coaches.

Andy seems to have had his share of risky moments:

*'A serious accident happened to the Willunga mail coach on Tuesday afternoon at the corner of Wymouth Street and West Terrace. It appears that the sole cause of the mishap was the team being turned too sharply round upon the terrace... [and]... the vehicle fell over on the footpath. Several of the passengers jumped off... Mr. Wilkie, an outside passenger, was thrown to the ground with great force ... Mr. and Mrs. Kell jun, with a baby, were among the passengers, and, though not seriously injured, would not tempt the dangers of the road any further that day. Andy O'Brien, the driver, was quite uninjured. The guard was somewhat hurt, but proceeded on the journey with Andy and the remaining passengers, amongst whom were Mr. Whinnerah and Mr. Low, solicitor.'* (Express and Telegraph 18 March 1868:2)

It appears, however, that Andy had a period of illness following the accident and later resumed work driving the coach to Aldinga:

*'Messrs. Cobb & Co. have put on a new omnibus to Aldinga. It is considered a great improvement to the one lately in use. Mr. Andy O'Brien, who has been for some time past unwell, has again made his appearance, to the no small delight of numbers who have to travel that route, whilst it is hoped he will be long spared to use the whip.'* (Express and Telegraph 18 March 1868:2)

In September 1858, when he used to drive the coach from Willunga to the Golden Fleece Hotel in Currie Street, Andy was in the Adelaide Court. The proprietor, Mr Schmidt, sought payment of £4/5- for 68 dinners. During the hearing, it became clear that Mr Harriot, the previous owner of the Golden Fleece, had allowed Andy 'free access to the larder'. Mr Schmidt had taken the hotel over and hadn't told him that the arrangement had changed.

This final story sums up Andy's droll manner and aptitude as a coach driver:

*'I have a better knowledge of some of the old drivers in the south; between Adelaide and Willunga. The man who stands out in my memory is Andy O'Brien; he was surely a witty fellow. I never knew a passenger able to take a rise out of him. In those days the last changing station before reaching the city was on the top of Tapley's Hill, quite the wrong place from which to start downhill with a fresh team of horses. On one occasion, just as the ostler released the horses, the offside leader stood up on his hind legs and bolted off, taking the whole box of tricks with him. Down we went hell for leather, now on one pair of wheels, then on the other - every moment in expectation of an almighty smash. Providentially a careless, but heaven-sent woodcarter had dropped a log; the front wheels butted fair and square into it, skidded, and the coach was brought to a standstill. Halting in front of the Victoria Hotel, the passengers dismounted for a 'steadier.' I invited Andy to join. 'Sure, faith,' cried he, 'coming down the hill beyant I thought it was in hell itself you and I would be having the next little drop together!'* (Register 30 July 1921:4)

## LOVE AND EVIDENCE

When Jesus says, "If you love me, you will keep my commandments" one might think Jesus is giving the disciples some sort of ultimatum (Jn 14: 15). If you love me, you will keep my commands. We must remember, however, that Jesus does not force us to do anything. Rather, Jesus continually offers an invitation to follow him. With this, Jesus' words sound much more like a simple statement of fact. The disciples will keep Jesus' commandments because of their love for Jesus. Similarly, we will keep the commandments of Jesus because we love Jesus. There is no force or threat behind these words. That is not how God operates.

The love that Jesus describes is much more than an emotion. In Jesus, love requires self-gift. When we are called to love, we are called to offer ourselves. This love requires personal investment and sacrifice, things that are not always easy. We become vulnerable when we give of ourselves. We open our hearts to criticism and judgement. Sometimes we experience disappointment and hurt. But this is part of being disciples of the Risen Christ. This is how we participate in Christ's life, death and Resurrection. This is how we live the Paschal Mystery.

Part of self-giving love is saying yes even when we would rather not. We are called to say yes dozens of times each day. How do we respond? What are some of the things God invites you to say yes to today? These yeses are not necessarily complicated, and can be as simple as spending time with a friend or helping a younger student with her homework. What can you say yes to today? Be courageous and grow in Christ with each yes you proclaim.

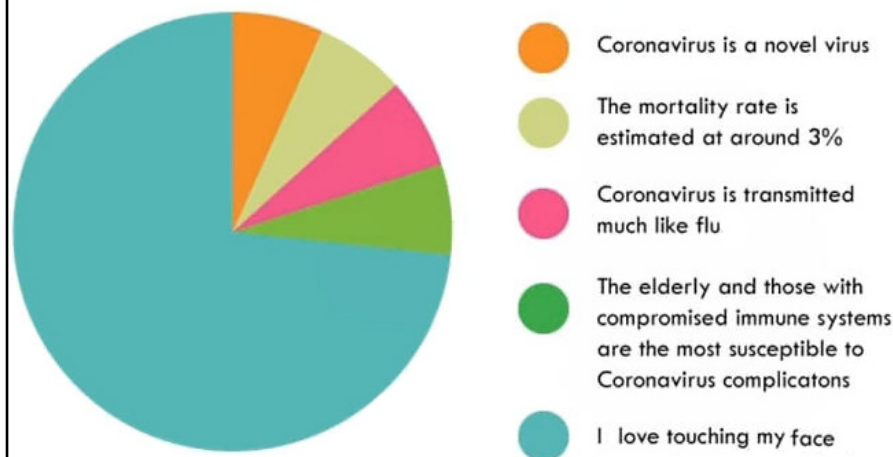
#### Direct payments

If you would like to organise your Church donations via bank transfer there are several ways you can go about this.

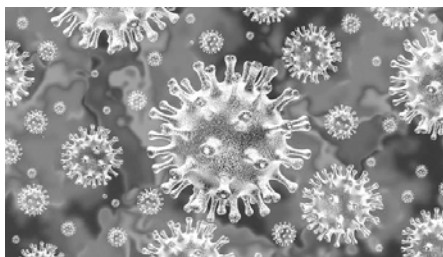

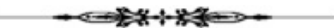

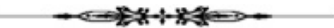

### GOSPEL

**John 14:15-21**

Jesus said to his disciples:

‘If you love me you will keep my commandments. I shall ask the Father, and he will give you another Advocate to be with you for ever, that Spirit of truth whom the world can never receive since it neither sees nor knows him; but you know him, because he is with you, he is in you. I will not leave you orphans; I will come back to you. In a short time the world will no longer see me; but you will see me, because I live and you will live. On that day you will understand that I am in my Father and you in me and I in you. Anybody who receives my commandments and keeps them will be one who loves me; and anybody who loves me will be loved by my Father, and I shall love him and show myself to him.’

### SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

*Speak out with a voice of joy ...  
the Lord has set his people free!*

Even though we remain conscious of the real trauma that many continue to struggle with today, there is a sense of joy in this week’s readings. We hear of it arising from the marvellous acts of the apostles (today’s First Reading), and also in the Psalm, a hymn rejoicing in the great things the Lord has done for his people.

In the same way, we have a taste of this joy in the Gospel promise: the Spirit will be given to us, and the Lord will be in us and we in the Lord.

Even the sufferings meted out to the followers of Christ (Second Reading) could not diminish their gratitude for the Lord. This was bound up in the hope of the Resurrection which gave them, as it today gives us, the reason to respect one another and to reverence the Lord.

This week, let’s pray that the trials we have faced over the past months, and the sufferings we continue to endure, will not hold back the life of the Spirit in us. In all things, may we speak with joy of the good things the Lord has done and continues to work in our lives. *“Australian Catholics”*

### O SAY CAN YOU SEE

Ellie signed on to teach a year in Bolivia. She enjoyed the work, the country, and the people - especially one young man. Oscar, who was intelligent, good-hearted, and handsome. That year, she and Oscar fell in love. Eventually, he came to Australia, and they got married at her parish church in outer Brisbane. Oscar had held an important job in Bolivia, but his hard-earned credentials did not transfer to Australia. His grasp of English was shaky. The only job he could find was working as a banquet waiter at a local hotel. Guests call him “Boy,” whistled or clapped at him to get his attention and felt free to boss him around. But mostly they ignored him; they did not see him at all.

He would come home from work sullen, and Ellie felt excruciating pain that this proud man was being treated as nothing. The world did not see Oscar, but Ellie saw him.

Today, Jesus tells the apostles, “In a little while the world will no longer see me, but you will see me”. The world could pass Jesus by on the street and ignore him. They could whistle to get his attention and call him “Boy” because he does not live in them nor they in him. They could do that easily - after all, each day they do it to the least of his sisters and brothers. *GPBS eNews*
